Field Trip to Deopahar Archaeological Site from the Department of Education, Kamargaon College, Golaghat

On 2nd April 2024, the 4th-semester Department of Education students and one faculty member undertook a field trip to Deopahar. Deopahar is an archaeological site located in Numaligarh, Assam, India. It is one of the most note-worthy ancient heritages of the Golaghat District of Assam. Numaligarh is prominently known as one of the archaeologically rich places of the state because of the historical remains of the ancient temple and sculptures that were excavated from the top of the Deopahar. The ancient stone temple and sculptures uncovered at this site are fine specimens of ancient art that represent the interconnection between Aryan art and local art, thus providing enough data for historians to determine the period it was created. It is a protected archaeological park with a site museum under the Directorate of Archaeology, Govt. of Assam. The construction of the stone temple appears to be incomplete or damaged possibly during the Assam earthquake of 1897.

Archaeological sites preserve the societal structures, religious beliefs and lifestyles of ancient civilizations, providing insight into their past as well. These sites are imbued with the values of the societies that created them. Students tend to be able to trace their histories and locate themselves within the historical continuum by studying these sites.
