## **Anti - Harassment Policy**



## **Anti- Ragging Policy**

As per UGC regulations on curbing the hazard of ragging in higher educational institutions, 2009, the college is committed to keep the campus ragging free. The college campus strictly adheres to the anti-ragging policy of its own for zero tolerance towards ragging:

- 1. According to the UGC Ragging Regulation of 2009 as well as the state and central government guidelines, anti-ragging undertakings from parents and students must be obtained at the time of admission, alerting them to the repercussions of breaking the rule.
- 2. All the provisions of the Central and the State government statutes must be strictly adhered to, as ragging is a crime that merits legal action.
- 3. An Anti-ragging Cell is constituted which will operate under the direction of the Principal.
- 4. Strict supervision on student activities during the admission period and at the beginning of the academic year is to be maintained.
- 5. Upon receiving a complaint of ragging from the anti-ragging cell, the institution is required to handle the matter seriously by adhering to existing UGC regulations. This may involve notifying and registering the incident with the nearest police station.

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- 6. Teachers should be instructed to look for signs of strain and stress in order to spot possible offenders and vulnerable victims. Such situations should be reported to the college's Antiragging Cell so that a prompt resolution may be found.
- 7. It is necessary to identify the areas on college campuses where there may be ragging and to maintain regular surveillance over those areas.
- 8. If necessary, trained counsellors or the Anti-ragging Cell will offer counselling services. The Principal of the college will receive their reports on a regular basis.
- 9. The college anti-ragging cell will notify the stakeholders on a regular basis upon obtaining any instructions, information, or court orders pertaining to ragging from the federal, state, UGC, or other sources.
- 10. The institution must take action to ensure that every student actively participates in cultural festivals and other academic events in order to automatically narrow the gap between seniors and juniors.
- 11. The college's anti-ragging policy should be made abundantly evident on both the website and campus as well as in the prospectus and other materials pertaining to admission.
- 12. If needed, the Anti-Ragging Cell will inform, interact, and consult parents about the rights and safety of their children. If necessary, special sessions may be held.
